
Matthew Hutton (1529-1606)

- Elizabeth Bowes' father-in-law
- Bought Marske Estate 1590s
- Archbishop of York in 1595
- In favour with Elizabeth I




Hutton family Around 1900

- No one was at home when artillerymen roamed the moors in 1926
- Hutton vs Minister of War
- Acquisitions in 1926 and 1940.
- Reduced Estate by two-thirds.




The Willance Cup: 1606









- Family silver sold in 1987


Bristol Blenheim Mark I
